Introduction to Criminal Justice

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Content Outline & Learning Objectives

A CourXam has no syllabus because the amount of time spent and the order of content areas are entirely up to the learner. Credit earned is based only upon the results of the college credit exam, which will measure the student's mastery of the material.

Each CourXam has six general content areas (noted as COs) and each of these general content areas are broken down into three modules (noted as MOs) as outlined on the next page.

The relative weight of each general content area is included on the outline and the reference materials to be used for each module are also identified. All instructional materials are included within the digital instruction in a CourXam. No additional textbooks, articles, or other materials are required to learn the material.

Introduction to Criminal Justice covers and measures knowledge and understanding of material typically taught in a one-semester, 3-credit, lower-level undergraduate introductory course in criminal justice. It covers the general concepts, principles, and processes related to the American criminal justice system, focusing on law enforcement, courts, and correctional practices and issues, and addresses ethical, legal, and discretionary concerns relevant for professionals and others interacting with the criminal justice system.

III: Law Enforcement (20%)

General Information

What is a CourXam?

A CourXam is a combination of a self-paced, digital college course and a college credit exam.
